STEADFASTNESS PSALM 1:6

"For the LORD knows the way of the righteous, but the way of the ungodly shall perish." NKJV

Showing Up: Psalm 1:1, "Blessed is the one who does not walk in step with the wicked or stand in the way that sinners take or sit in the company of mockers..."

NIV

Psalm 1 has been one of my favorite psalms going back at least to the 1980s. Why? First off, it is short and easy to remember. Second, it starts with a blessing which is always encouraging to my spirit. I need blessings, and you need blessings.

How do we obtain this blessing? We show up where we should be, and we do not go to places that tempts us to dishonor God. Emmaus Walks, Emmaus Gatherings, and Emmaus Reunion groups are good places to be to receive blessings, and more importantly they are good places to be a blessing to others.

Trusting the Word: Psalm 1:1-2, "Blessed is the one...whose delight is in the law of the LORD and who meditates on his law, day and night." NIV

As followers of Christ, when all else fails, we have the Word of God. The Word is true, and trustworthy, and uplifting. The temptation is to believe that we know better than the Word. We are more educated than many of our ancestors. We have knowledge at our fingertips via our mobile devices, and our computers. Our social mores have "evolved" and we are more in touch with our feelings and the feelings of others. Knowledge, without humility and the fear of God, is

like a mental quicksand that can also consume and alienate the soul. To be blessed, or to be happy, is to be sure that the Word of God is a trustworthy anchor for our soul. Our Emmaus community encourages each of us to study the Word.

Steadfastness: Psalm 1:3, "That person is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither – whatever they do prospers." NIV

Standing strong in the face of temptation, during times of great trials, and when life does not make sense is a powerful witness to those without God. They can look and wonder, but they cannot know this strength, or this peace, until they trust God too. When we follow God, when we follow Jesus, and when we follow the Holy Spirt – we cannot fail. Why? Because God cannot fail; Jesus cannot fail; the Holy Spirit cannot fail. When we stand strong with God the only thing we can do is prosper! Being faithful to Emmaus helps to build our steadfastness!

Encouragement: Psalm 1:6, "For the LORD watches over the way of the righteous, but the way of the wicked leads to destruction". God helps to watch over our way when we place ourselves among a community of believers. Sometimes the hardest thing to do with Emmaus is to show up — to a reunion group, to a gathering, or to a walk.

Show up. Trust the Word. Be strong. Then get ready to be fruitful and prosperous.


So how then should we think about these blessings? How can we reconcile the fact that we've been blessed with so much—so much more than millions of men and women around the world?

Walk #100 and #101 are just around the corner, so jump in, volunteer, make agape, join the prayer vigil, and/or donate books! You will be blessed.



Breathe and focus. Focus and priorities are what our life is all about! (Made my bed at this point because if you make your bed, you at least have one accomplishment for the day)!


Proverbs 23:7
