# GraceEmmaus Walk 72 Disciples Crossing

Even the problems faced by the Emmaus team for Walk 72 became blessings. As an example, early Thursday morning, Oct. 12 (the first day of the Walk) our Spiritual Director, Rev. Ricky Ricks had a family emergency which would prevent him from attending 100% the Walk as he had planned. No problem, Rev. Ricks called Assistant Spiritual Director, soon to be Walk 72 Spiritual Director, Rev. Richard Luna. These thoughtful men, working without any hint of ego, combined their talents to be one of the "Best Spiritual Directors ever". The other Assistant Spiritual Directors, Jarratt Major, Jim Pickens, and Jon Thornsbury did their usual excellent jobs. It was clear, early

Well, a majority of the Walk 72 team showed up for each of the team meetings. That should have been a clear message to me that the Holy Spirit was fully present.

Speaking of team training, I would be remiss if I didn't mention how helpful it is to work with someone like Babby Carroll, the LD for Walk 73. She made setting up combined training easy and effective. I learned a lot about true Christian cooperation from Babby. Thanks Babby.

As we all know, one of the most important jobs on all Walks is Outside Team Leader. I worried about a lot of things, but the Outside Team was not among them. Jay Edwards and his group made the whole weekend work like a well oiled machine. The Chapel Team led by Jim Buchanan came up with some innovative arrangements in the Chapel that made Walk 72 really special.

The Assistant Lay Directors, Mac Young, Mac Walling and Mike Johnston did the fantastic job in the conference room that I knew they would, while they had to put up with my constant questions- "Have we\_\_\_\_\_?" To fill out the conference room team we had a great music team (Loren Lykins, Mark Jarrard, and John Crow) as well as the best AV person in the business, Tom McDonald.

Finally, I want to recognize the pilgrims of Walk 72. It was clear that they didn't anticipate and they approached the entire weekend with idealism as well as a spirit of cooperation and charity. Those words are repeated throughout the weekend but sometimes they seem to be lost but not this time. The pilgrims chose to take the maximum possible impact from what the weekend provided.

My sincere thanks to the entire GRACE Community for allowing me the blessing of leading Walk 72.



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# Fourth Day Spotlight – Janet Bagley, GRACE Walk 69

My name is Janet Bagley. I attended Grace Emmaus Walk #69 at Disciple's Crossing in the Spring of 2014. I worship at White Oak Community Church in White Oak, Texas. It was a little over a year ago that I was introduced to this phrase. And what a year it has been. I went on my walk with quite a bit of fear and trepidation. I will admit I am a control freak and I love my schedules. So not knowing what was going to happen or when it was going to happen was really pushing me out of my comfort levels. And little did I know that in 72 hours I would learn more about the Christian faith and myself than I had in 48 vears.

In that 72 hours I realized that God's grace and love for me is more than I had ever imagined. As a child my family did not attend church regularly and I always felt lacking in my knowledge. Paired along with low self-esteem, I always felt not quite worthy as others. Through the presentations, lectures and interactions with the Emmaus Community, I came to realize that I am worthy and that God loves me no matter what. I love the saying that God loves you just the way you are but he loves you too much to let you stay that way. I

realized that even at 48 I was a work in progress and that I could still grow and learn. I left the Walk with a new sense and purpose in my life. I was able to make some decisions that changed my life for the better that previously I probably would not have made because I wouldn't have wanted to spend the money or energy on myself. I never wanted to lose that feeling that I had on that last Sunday of the Walk.

As most of us know, getting back to the "real world" seemed to at times overwhelm me and the Emmaus Walk high started waning. I have found that attending the Gatherings helps me put things back in perspective. But the most wonderful thing I have found to get me centered back in the right frame of mind is attending the Walks and just being part of the Emmaus Community. Being on the other side of Candlelight is almost as amazing as it was being a pilgrim. I encourage each and every one of you to try and become active in the Emmaus Community. The friends that my husband David and I have made thru Emmaus are priceless to us. They are more like family than friends. To say that I was hesitant about attending the Walk would be an understatement, but I am so glad I did. The knowledge, friendships, and peace I gained are immeasurable. # The Prayer to the Holy Spirit from the Commonplace Holiness Blog by Craig L. Adams

It is characteristic ... that at the beginning of the ... talks ... given on the [Emmaus] weekend, some

on the [Emmaus] weekend, some version of the following prayer is recited by the participants:

Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit, and they shall be created and You shall renew the face of the earth. O God, who by the light of the Holy Spirit, did instruct the hearts of the faithful, grant that by the same Holy Spirit

we may be truly wise and ever enjoy His consolations. Through Christ Our Lord. Amen.

This is an ancient prayer. It is so ancient that no one knows who wrote it. The last part of the prayer dates back at least as far as the ninth century, since a version of it is found in the Gregorian Sacramentary.

So, participants on these weekends learn this prayer, but they don't always understand it. Some actually learn to dislike it, since it is difficult to understand. And, since they are required to recite it, it becomes to them simply a prayer they pray by rote.

Pastor Adams happens to think it's a wonderful prayer. It just needs some explanation. The prayer falls into three distinct parts.

1. An Invitation to the Holy Spirit: "Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love."

It is this phrase of the prayer, more than anything else, which gives it the common titles "The Prayer to the Holy Spirit" or "The Holy Spirit Prayer." Usually, prayer is addressed to God the Father through (or in the name of) the Son, in (or inspired by) the Holy Spirit — and this prayer is, too. But, it begins with an invitation for the Spirit to inspire all of God's faithful — and that would include the hearers of the talk. This phrase recognizes that it is the Holy Spirit that inspires Christians to pray. "Pray in the Spirit at all times in every prayer and supplication. To that end keep alert and always persevere in supplication for all the saints." (Ephesians 6:18 NRSV). Most of all, it is the fire of love that the Holy Spirit inspires: "...God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy

Spirit that has been given to us." (Romans 5:5 NRSV).

A Bible Verse (Psalm 104:30):
 "Send forth your Spirit, and they shall be created and You shall renew the face of the earth."

Many people who recite this prayer do not realize that this is a Bible verse. Psalm 104 is a psalm of praise to God for God's creation of all the earth and its creatures. "O LORD, how manifold are your works! In wisdom you have made them all; the earth is full of your creatures." (Psalms 104:24 NRSV). God not only creates all living things, but he sustains them. "These all look to you to give them their food in due season; when you give to them, they gather it up; when you open your hand, they are filled with good things. When you hide your face, they are dismayed; when you take away their breath. they die and return to their dust." (Psalms 104:27-29 NRSV). Then we read the phrase: "When you send forth your spirit, they are created; and you renew the face of the earth." God is active in creating and sustaining — and in re-creating!

The Spirit who inspires our prayers is also the Spirit of all life. So, the invitation for the Spirit's inspiration is enhanced by a Biblical reminder of who the Spirit is — and what the Spirit does. By the Spirit, God creates — and recreates.

# 3. A Prayer:

"O God, who by the light of the Holy Spirit, did instruct the hearts of the faithful, grant that by the same Holy Spirit, we may be truly wise and ever enjoy His consolations.

Through Christ Our Lord. Amen."

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This is the prayer itself. The first two parts can be seen as a preparation for this prayer. Notice... that this is a prayer to God through Christ inspired by the Holy Spirit. As God instructed the hearts of the faithful in times past, so may God also instruct us today. The purpose of such inspiration is two-fold: that we might be "truly wise" — with the wisdom of God — and that we might "ever enjoy God's consolations" — all the gifts of God's grace.

It is this part of the prayer that goes back to at least the ninth century — and probably earlier. Thus, when we join in this prayer we are joining with the early church — and with the faithful of Israel as they sang their psalms — in praying for the continued inspiration and re-creation of the Holy Spirit.

All in all, it's quite an inspiring and powerful prayer — if we understand it.

While this does make it more personal, it also obscures the fact that the second sentence is actually a Bible verse. People may wonder why they are praying for God to "create" them when they have (evidently) already been created. But, remember: this is an affirmation of who the Spirit is and what the Spirit does. God creates us by the Spirit, because it is always the Spirit of God that gives life. God re-creates us in love through faith in Jesus Christ. So, while that part of the current Emmaus version of the prayer is a little strange, if you know it is a reference to Psalm 104:30 you still get the idea.

This prayer also lends itself to responsive reading:

Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love.

Send forth your Spirit, and they shall be created.

And You shall renew the face of the earth.

# Let us pray.

O God, who by the light of the Holy Spirit, did instruct the hearts of the faithful, grant that by the same Holy Spirit we may be truly wise and ever enjoy His consolations. Through Christ Our Lord. Amen.

All in all, this is a wonderful prayer. It is a way of praying with the early church and with the faithful down through the ages for the inspiration and power of the Holy Spirit. It also joins us with the ancient praises of Israel.

And to round this off, he adds a YouTube video (https://youtu.be/\_8UTX\_eszkk) of a rock n roll version of the first part of the prayer to the Holy Spirit. Unfortunately the maker of this video does not know who wrote or recorded this musical version. The words of the song are based on both Psalm 104:30 and Isaiah 11:2 ("The spirit of the LORD shall rest on him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the LORD." NRSV.)
